

2011-2012

1. Introduction

The National Arts Centre (NAC) is pleased to provide its fourth annual report on the administration of the *Access to Information Act* (ATIA) for the fiscal year 2011-2012, as required by section 72 of the Act.

The ATIA is based on the following principles:

- government information should be made available to Canadians and permanent residents of Canada;
- exceptions to the right of access should be limited and specific, and;
- decisions on the disclosure of government information should be reviewed independently of government.

2. Mandate

The National Arts Centre Corporation was established in 1966 pursuant to the *National Arts Centre Act* and began operating the Centre in 1969. The NAC reports to Parliament through the Minister of Canadian Heritage.

The NAC is a federal cultural organization dedicated primarily to developing and showcasing the performing arts in the National Capital Region and across Canada. It is a multidisciplinary performing arts centre that features classical music, dance, English and French language theatre, regional programming, special events and variety shows. The NAC takes part in co-productions with other organizations throughout the country, hosts festivals, and, through its new technologies and international tours, reaches out to audiences across Canada and around the world. It is at the forefront of youth and educational activities, supporting programmes for young and emerging artists and programmes for young audiences and producing resources and study materials for teachers.

In furtherance of its objectives to operate and maintain the Centre, the Corporation may arrange for and sponsor performing arts activities at the centre; encourage and assist in the development of performing arts companies resident at the Centre; arrange for or sponsor radio and television broadcasts and the screening of films in the Centre; provide accommodation at the Centre, on such terms and conditions as the Corporation may fix, for national and local organizations whose objectives include the development and encouragement of the performing arts in Canada; and, at the request of the Government of Canada or the Canada Council for the Arts, arrange for performances elsewhere in Canada by performing arts companies, whether resident or non-resident in Canada, and arrange for performances outside Canada by performing arts companies resident in Canada.

The Corporation is deemed, under Section 15 of the *National Arts Centre Act*, to be a registered charity within the meaning of that expression in the *Income Tax Act*.

3. Institution and Delegation Order

The NAC is presided by a Board of Trustees consisting of eight members from across Canada who are appointed by the Governor in Council and two ex-officio members. It has the authority to appoint a President of the Centre, who is Chief Executive Officer, responsible for the operation and administration of the Corporation and its Centre.

The NAC's Access to Information and Privacy (ATIP) Office consists of one ATIP Coordinator on a contract basis.

Pursuant to Section 73 of the ATIA, delegated authority has been designated to the person holding the position of ATIP Coordinator, to exercise or perform all powers, duties and functions of the CEO and President under the Act insofar as they may be exercised or performed in relation to the NAC.

4. Summary of the NAC's access to information activities during the fiscal year 2011-2012

The NAC received five access to information requests. Three of these requests were completed during this fiscal year while two were carried forward.

The statistical report for the period April 1, 2011 to March 31, 2012 is appended.

Interpretation of the statistical report

During this fiscal period, the NAC processed one request from the business sector, one request from an organization and one request from the media.

Disposition of the requests

Of the three access to information requests received and completed during this reporting period, portions of information was disclosed for one request; no information was disclosed for one request; and one request was abandoned by the applicant.

All three requests were processed and completed within the 30 day statutory limit.

5. Education and Training

The Coordinator did not participate in briefing sessions held by the Treasury Board Secretariat. It is anticipated that the Coordinator will participate in any relevant training, meetings and conferences offered by the federal and provincial governments in the 2012-2013 fiscal year.

6. Administration of the Access to Information Act

There were no events of note affecting the Office of the NAC ATIP Coordinator in the last year.

7. Complaints, Investigations and Reviews to the Federal Court

No complaints were lodged with the Office of the Information Commissioner of Canada during this fiscal period. There are currently no outstanding complaints. There were no appeals or reviews made to the Federal Court for the 2011-2012 fiscal year.

1. Introduction

4. Summary of the NAC's privacy activities during the fiscal year

The NAC did not receive any requests under the *Privacy Act* during this fiscal year.

5. Information on Privacy Impacts Assessments (PIA)

No Privacy Impact Assessments were conducted this past year, as none were required.

6. Data Matching and Data Sharing

There were no new data matching and data sharing activities undertaken during this reporting period.

7. Education and Training

The Coordinator participated in quarterly briefing sessions held by the Treasury Board Secretariat. It is anticipated that the Coordinator will participate in any relevant training, meetings and conferences offered by the federal and provincial governments in the 2012-2013 fiscal year.
